INTRODUCTION

The hockey reunion lunch on September 17, 2011 was held to remember and celebrate the first four years of York's hockey history. This history involved seven teams:

1963-64	York Intercollegiate Team York Second Team	Head Coach: Arthur Boynton Head Coach: ?

A list of names for the reunion was assembled from information provided by the York University Alumni Association, the York hockey alumni and personal contacts. The final list was fairly accurate for the First team or A team, but information for the Second team or B team is still incomplete.

Nineteen former players (Brian Adamson, Fred Andrew, George Brett, Ken Campbell, Ron Cuthbert, Russ Finch, Doug Markle, Mike McMullen, Roger McNeely, John Morton, Bob Myrvold, Ray Nason, Paul Pagniello, Neville Rich, George Rust-D'Eye, Doug Rutherford, Harvey Sheppard, Dale Taylor and Bruce Walker), three former coaches (Harry Boyd, Bill Purcell, and Donald Rickerd), Marilyn Boynton, the wife of the late Arthur Boynton, Jim Wells, the current York men's head hockey coach and Bruce Logan, Senior Development Officer at York, attended the reunion. Regrets were received from Roy Conacher, Doug Geork, Brian McGee, Tom Millius, Denis Smith and Tom Wright.

George Rust-D'Eye brought a special edition of the PRO-TEM, that he prepared, dated September 17, 2011, to commemorate those early years of hockey that were captured in the PRO-TEMs of the early 1960s.

The York Hockey Trivia Contest winners were Harvey Sheppard and Roger McNeely, and the Draw winners were Donald Rickerd and Bill Purcell. Bruce Walker kindly donated wine prizes for these winners.

September 2011 was the 50th anniversary of the opening of York's Glendon Campus. The itinerary for Saturday, September 17th was structured so that former students, such as the hockey players attending the reunion, could spend time at Glendon later in the afternoon for a nostalgia/memory lane tour of the facilities

BACKGROUND

These first four seasons of York hockey (“*the first years*”) produced a number of significant **Firsts**:

- The school began admitting students in the fall of 1960 and in that first year from a small group of male students, a hockey team was organized to play the 1960-61 season. The team played in the U of T interfaculty/intramural league that first year, 51 years ago this fall. They failed to win a game (0-6 or 0-8) but had the honour of being York’s **First** hockey team to compete with York sweaters.
- With more students in the second year and with the opening of the Glendon campus, York iced two teams in the U of T league for 1961-62: the First team or A team and the Second team or B team. Both had winning records with the A team winning its division. This was the **First** championship team for York and the team celebrated by purchasing very distinctive red York hockey jackets.
- In the third year of York hockey (1962-63), York entered varsity competition with the First Team (A team) joining the Ontario Intercollegiate Athletic Association (OIAA). Perhaps, not surprisingly the team was winless, but spirited. This was York’s **First** intercollegiate Men’s hockey team. The Second team played in the U of T league.
- The fourth season (1963-64) brought together the strongest A team yet. The team became the **First** York intercollegiate team to have a winning record. The team was 4-2, tied for first place and lost to Osgoode Hall 3-2 in overtime. The B team played in the U of T league.

There were three other **Firsts** of note for players of these first four years:

- The Glendon outdoor ice rink opened in the winter of 1963-64. The **First** hockey game was an exhibition game played in January 1964, which York won.
- In the winter of 1964-65, a group of the hockey players, who played in the first four years at York, made arrangements to have ice time every Monday night at the Glendon outdoor rink. This was the **First** York alumni hockey. The activity evolved into a gathering of the old boys on Mondays. Over time and not only during the hockey season, they would go to the Jolly Miller, downtown to the Le Coq D’Or, the Friars or the like, or to someone’s house. In essence, this would be the start of the social side of York hockey alumni.
- At the Glendon ice rink in the 1964-65 season, the York hockey alumni played the York 1964-65 Intercollegiate team in an exhibition game. This was the **First** game between York hockey alumni and the varsity team.

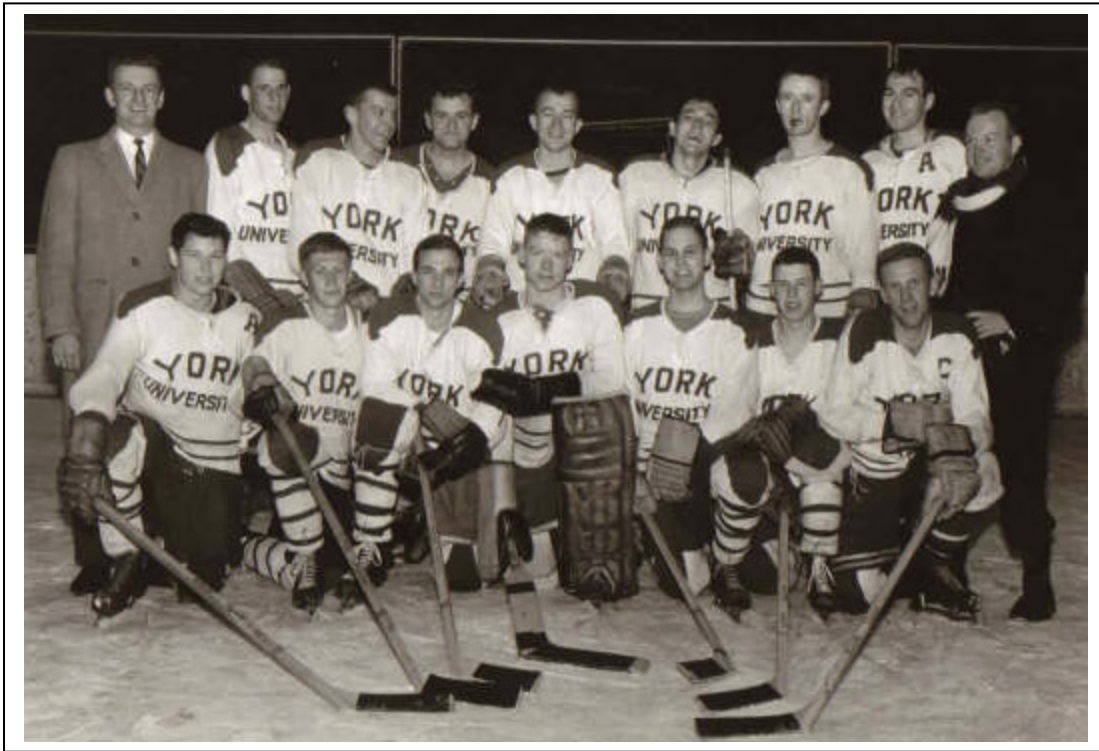

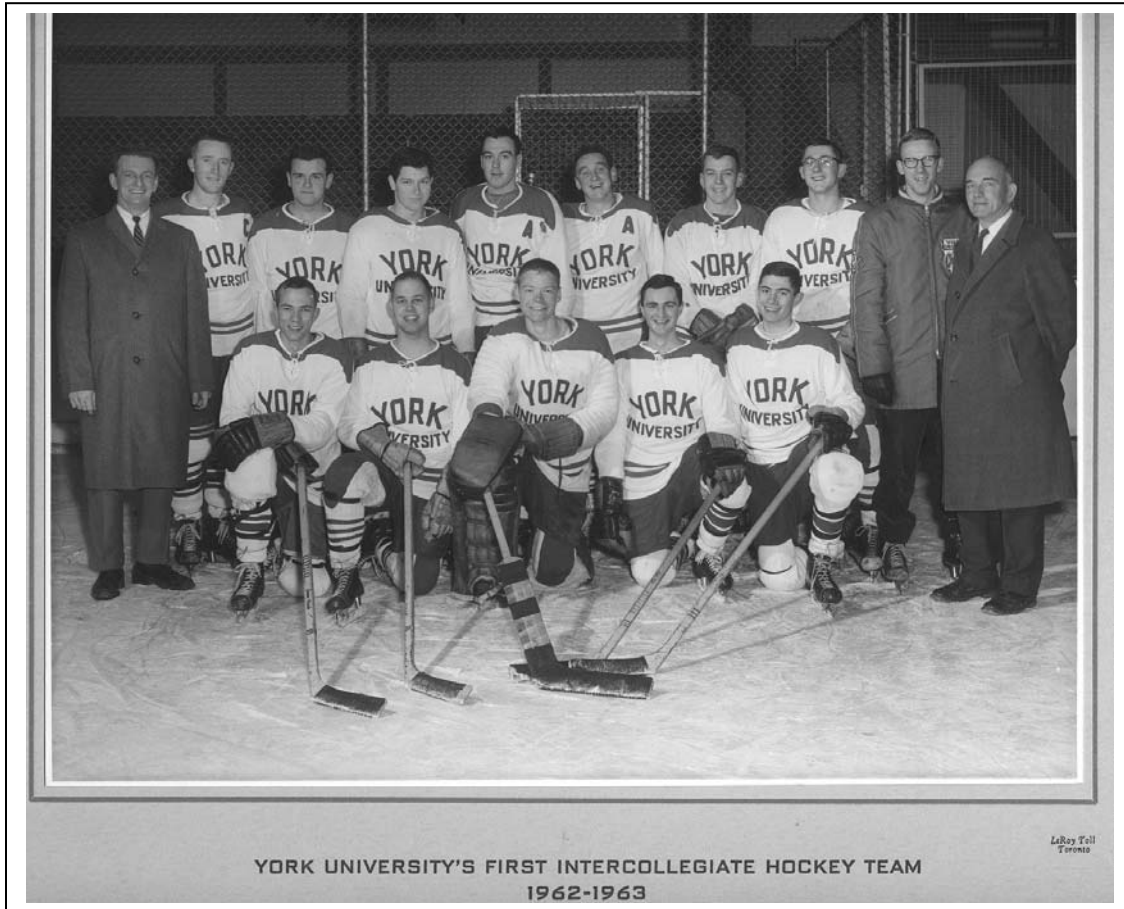

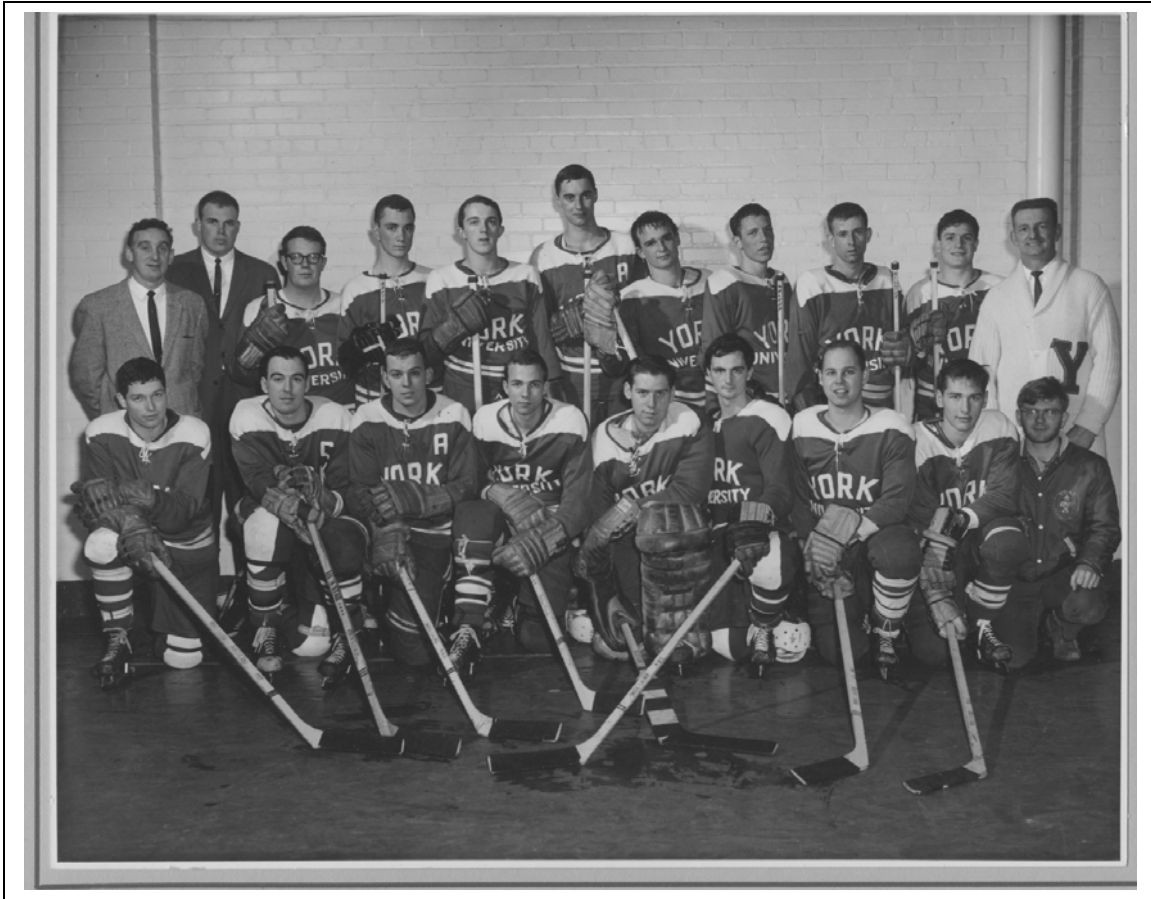

Last Saturday the York University Basketball Windigoes travelled to Sudbury Ontario to face the team from Laurentian University. The team was somewhat shorthanded due to the absence of rookies Jim Forsyth, Al "Stubby" Cohen and third year man Roger Hyman. After leaving Toronto Saturday morning we arrived in Sudbury at around three thirty. After checking into the hotel and eating dinner, the team proceeded to Sudbury High School where the game was being played. After going through the pre-game warm-ups, the season began with York being awarded a technical foul shot due to an infraction of the rules by the Laurentian team.

York fell behind at the start of the game, but by some accurate shooting by centre Dave Allen, the score for the first half was kept at a rather respectable level: 46-27. The score is no indication of the play for York was unfortunately hampered by an uncooperating rim, which made the ball on several occasions bounce the wrong way, costing two points.

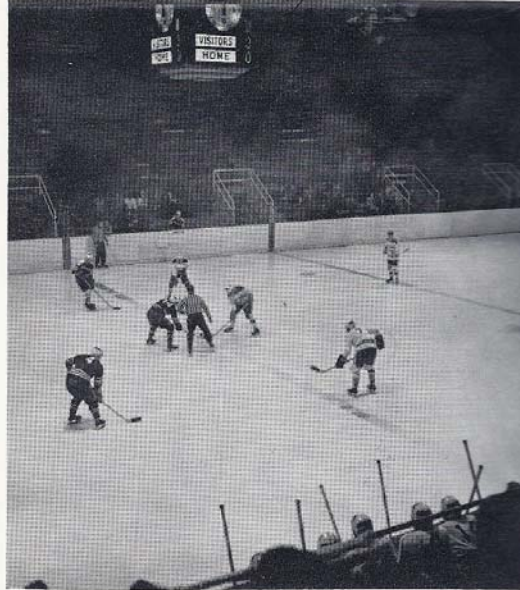

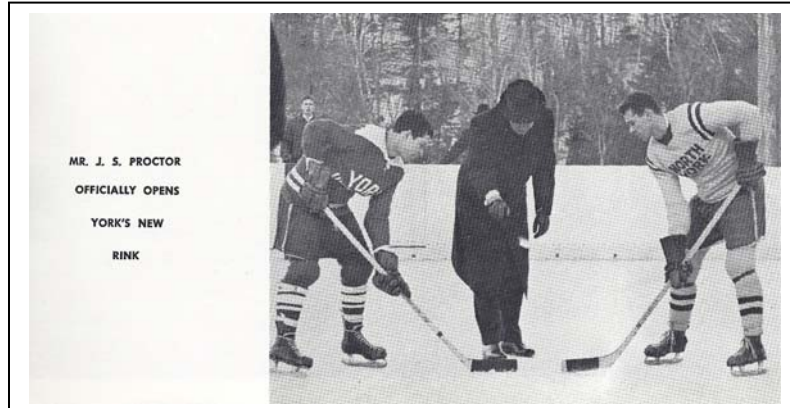
