Peace, Security & Human Rights

Panelists:

Professor Robert E. Bedeski, University of British Columbia

Robert Bedeski is Professor Emeritus, University of Victoria, Canada, and was awarded an Honorary Doctorate by the Mongolia Academy of Sciences in 2008, is also Honorary Professor, University of British Columbia; Affiliate Professor, Jackson School of International Studies, University of Washington; and Research Scholar, Institute for Security and Development Policy, Stockholm. His books include *The Transformation of South Korea: Reform and Reconstitution in the Sixth Republic under Roh Tae Woo, 1987-1992*. (London: Routledge, 1994), *Human Security and the Chinese State: Historical Transformations and the Modern Quest for Sovereignty*. (London: Routledge, 2007), and *Eurasia's Ascent in Energy and Geopolitics: China, Russia, and Central Asia*, (Co-edited with Niklas Swanstrom, Routledge, 2012).

Professor Gérard Hervouet, Université Laval

Gérard Hervouet is Professor in the Department of Political Science at Laval University. Director of the Program for Peace and Security Studies at the Institut des Hautes Études Internationales, he is also a member of the Board of this Institute. He is presently member of the Board of Governors of the Royal Military College in Kingston and member of the Board of Directors for the Canadian Association for Security and Intelligence Studies (CASIS). He also was President of the Canadian Consortium on Asia-Pacific Security.

Erich Weingartner, Chief editor of CanKor, Toronto

A graduate of McMaster University and Waterloo Lutheran Seminary (Canada), Erich Weingartner has worked as research

assistant at the Lutheran World Federation in Geneva, as Deputy General Secretary of the International Documentation Centre (IDOC) in Rome, and as Executive Secretary of the Commission of the Churches on International Affairs (CCIA) in Geneva, where from 1978 to 1986 he guided the World Council of Churches' (WCC) human rights policies. From May 1997 to July 1999 he lived and worked in Pyongyang, DPRK (North Korea) as founding Head of the Food Aid Liaison Unit (FALU) of the United Nations World Food Programme (WFP). His published works include *Church Within Socialism* (English and German, 1976/77); *The Wanderer* (with Sang Chul Lee, 1989); *Protecting Human Rights: A Manual for Practitioners* (English and Russian, 1995); *NGO Contributions to DPRK Development: Issues for Canada and the International Community* (2001). His numerous articles, speeches and papers, include "The World Church and the Search for a Just Peace", in *Canadian Churches and Foreign Policy* (1990), "Human Rights," in *Dictionary of the Ecumenical Movement* (1991) and "Human Rights in the New World Order" in *The Ecumenical Movement Tomorrow* (1993). For 12 years he wrote a monthly column "The Justice Agenda" (2000-2012).

Religion & Culture

Panelists:

Professor Donald Baker, Don Baker is a professor of Korean history and religion in the Department of Asian Studies at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver, Canada. He first became interested in Korea as Peace Corps Volunteer there in the early 1970s. He earned his doctorate in Korean history at the University of Washington in 1983 and has been teaching at UBC since 1987.

Among his recent publications are *Korean Spirituality* (University of Hawaii Press, 2008) and the co-edited volumes *Asian Religions in British Columbia* (University of British Columbia Press, 2010) and *Korea Confronts Globalization* (Routledge, 2008).

Mark Davies

Mark S. Davies is an academic librarian at St. Clair College in Windsor, Ontario, and the Official Delegate for Canada for the Korean Friendship Association. He has advanced degrees in the sociology of religion and social theory, as well a recent Bachelor of Theology in Christian studies. His Master's thesis was a study of the nature of conversion to fringe religions. Mr. Davies has travelled extensively in socialist countries and was in the DPRK in 2012 for the centenary of Kim Il Sung's birthday.

Reverend Kang YoungDo, Toronto Korean Bethel Evangelical Church

Rev. James Youngdo Kang is a second generation Korean-Canadian and is currently an English Ministry Pastor at Toronto Korean Bethel Evangelical Church. He has served in various church settings across different denominational, generational, and cultural lines. (He also has a heart for the hip-hop community and is a part of various ministries in that field.) Youngdo has gained an understanding that the Korean church is as much an ethnic community centre as well as a religious one, observing how much a culture can shape a religion and not always the other way around.

Gender & Identity

Panelists:

Professor Choo Hae-Yeon, University of Toronto. Hae Yeon Choo is an Assistant Professor of Sociology at the University of Toronto, Mississauga. Her research centers on the intersections of gender, sexuality, transnational migration, and citizenship for understanding complex inequalities. Her most recent project was a comparative ethnographic analysis of gendered migrant incorporation in South Korea in the case of migrant factory workers, migrant wives, and American military camptown club hostesses. Her current project examines the cartographies of gender and global stratification that emerge from the encounter between women refugee claimants and adjudicators at the site of refugee case law in Canada.

Professor Janice Kim, York University. Janice C. H. Kim is an associate professor of History at York University in Toronto, Ontario, Canada. Born in Seoul and raised in the Washington D.C. area, Dr. Kim has a B.A. and M.A. in History from The Johns Hopkins University (1996) and a M.A. in East Asian Studies (1997) and Ph.D. in History from the School of Oriental and African Studies (SOAS), University of London, U.K. (2001). Her first book, *To Live to Work: Factory Women in Colonial Korea, 1910-1945* (Stanford University Press, 2009), concerns the popular expansion of gender, labor and political consciousness among working women in colonial Korea.

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Professor Theresa Hyun, York University (Ph.D., University of Iowa) taught at the College of Foreign Languages, Kyung Hee University before coming to York University in 1992, where she is now associate professor. She has been teaching Korean Studies at York University since 1992. Her research focuses on translation and cultural changes in Korea since the late 19th century. Among her recent publications is : "Writing Women in Korea, Translation and Feminism in the Colonial Period" (U. of Hawaii Press, 2004). In 2012, she published a bilingual (Kore./Eng.) edition of her own poems "A Cup of Tea at P'anmunjom" / P'anmunjom eso ui ch'a han chan".

Migration, Immigration & Refugees

Panelists:

Professor Randall Baran, University of Toronto

Randall Baran-Chong is Executive Director of HanVoice, Canada's largest and leading not-for-profit on North Korean human rights and refugees. In 2010, he Chaired the 10th International Conference on North Korean Human Rights in Toronto - the world's largest of its kind, and was its first time held in North America. Over the years, he has given talks at schools, communities, conferences and events throughout Canada, built relationships with and advised local, federal, and international politicians and Ministers, and shared his thoughts with publications and media in Canada and abroad, and is currently leading the development of the world's first North Korean Refugee Leadership Program.

SYMPOSIUM SCHEDULE

Professor Nora Hui-Jung Kim, University of Mary Washington
Nora Hui-Jung Kim is an assistant professor in the Department of Sociology and Anthropology at the University of Mary Washington in Fredericksburg, Virginia. She received her Ph.D. from the University of Wisconsin, Madison in 2009. Her research and teaching interests include international immigration, multiculturalism, race and ethnicity, nationalism, and East Asia and she has published in *International Migration Review*, *Citizenship Studies*, *Nations and Nationalism*, and *Journal of Korean Studies*.

North Korea Refugee Alliance of Toronto

Tae Ha is President and Founder of the North Korean Refugees Alliance, and has spoken on behalf of the North Korean refugee community at various events and to media including the Toronto Star and Korea Times. Tae had left North Korea around 6 years ago, seeking medical help in China for his sick wife back home. He now lives in Toronto and leads one of Canada's leading organizations with North Korean refugees as members.

Economic & Social Development

Panelists:

Professor Thomas Klassen, York University, is a professor in the Department of Political Science, and the School of Public Policy and Administration, at York University. During 2006-07 he spent 15 months as Visiting Professor at Yonsei University in Seoul. In 2011 was Visiting Researcher at the Korea Labor Institute also in Seoul. He has written widely on Korea in both the popular media as well as in scholarly venues.

Professor J.D. Han, University of Toronto

Dr. J.D. Han is professor of economics and finance and department chair at King's University College at Western University (UWO) in London, Ontario. After graduating from Seoul National University, he worked for public think-tanks, including Korea International Economic Institute. On the Rotary Foundation Scholarship, he came to Canada for his Ph.D. in economics at the University of Toronto. He was professor at Carleton University, Ottawa, and research fellow at Chiang Ching-kuo Foundation, Washington, D.C. He has written numerous articles on the East Asian economies and societies, including a book chapter in *Korean Immigrants in Canada: Perspectives on Migration, Integration, and the Family* (Sam Noh, Ann H. Kim, and Marianne. S. Noh, eds.), which is published by the University of Toronto Press.

Professor Je-Sook Song, University of Toronto

Jesook Song is Associate Professor of Department of Anthropology at the University of Toronto. Her first book, *South Koreans in the Debt Crisis* (Duke University Press, 2009) deals with homelessness and youth unemployment during the Asian financial crisis in the late 1990s to early millennium in South Korea. Her second book *Living On Your Own* is forthcoming (SUNY), which is about single household and informal financial markets through single women's struggle in South Korea. Her edited volume *New Millennium South Korea* (Routledge, 2010) deals with variety of transnational movements and global capitals both coming into and coming from South Korea, such as foreign brides coming to Korea and Korean missionaries going out everywhere.

Foreign Policy & Bilateral Relations

Panelists:

Professor Jimin Kim, Jimin Kim is an instructor at the Kupferberg Holocaust Center at Queensborough Community College. She is currently teaching and coordinating East Asian Social Justice Internship Program at the Center. Dr. Kim specializes in modern Korean history and the history of U.S.-Korean relations. She received her B.A. and M.A. from Yonsei University and her Ph.D. from Columbia University in 2011.

Matthew Reichel, Matthew Reichel is the Executive Director of the East West Coalition and the Pyongyang Project, Vancouver-based educational and social entrepreneurship-focused organizations dedicated to providing academic enrichment opportunities for university students and faculty as well as developing sustainable social and humanitarian ventures in the DPRK. After five years and over twenty visits to the country, Matthew has worked with multiple institutions in the DPRK, including Kim Il Sung University, the Pyongyang Technology Services Centre, the Kim Il Sung Socialist Youth League, the Committee for Cultural Relations with Foreign Countries, the DPRK Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and Rason People's Committee. Projects have included placing North Korean university students abroad, implementing a six-month educational program for Kim Il Sung University university students and faculty in business, economics and foreign language at Yanbian University in China, organizing various track-II exchanges and student programs in the DPRK and most recently working on developing a social venture to assemble bicycles and wheelchairs in the DPRK. He is also working on a project focused on creating awareness of DPRK domestic brands as a way of better understanding the economic life for local people in the country.

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Matthew is a member of the Canadian Council for International Cooperation's Asia Pacific Working Group and has given presentations at the Department of Foreign Affairs and International Trade in Ottawa, McGill University, the University of Montreal, Moscow State University, Peking University, Duke University, George Washington University, and the University of Cambridge among others.

Greg Donaghy, Head of the Historical Section and Deputy Director, Policy Research Division, Foreign Affairs and International Trade Canada. He received his BA from the University of Toronto (1986), his MA from Carleton University (1989), and his PhD from the University of Waterloo (1998). He is General Editor of *Documents on Canadian External Relations*, as well as editor of six volumes in this series covering 1950 to 1957. He has edited or co-edited another nine collections of scholarly essays on Canadian history and diplomacy. These include, most recently, *Contradictory Impulses: Canada and Japan in the 20th Century* (with Patricia Roy/UBC: 2008); a special edition of *Canadian Foreign Policy* on "Canadian Multilateralism: Past, Present, and Future" (with David Black/Spring 2010); and *In the National Interest: Canada's Department of Foreign and International Trade, 1909-2009* (with Michael Carroll/University of Calgary Press, 2011). His publications include the monograph, *Tolerant Allies: Canada and the United States, 1963-1968* (McGill-Queens UP, 2002) as well as the recent articles, "To Know and Be Known: The Department of External Affairs and the Creation of the Asia-Pacific Foundation of Canada, 1978-84," *International Journal*, (Autumn 2009), and "Blessed Are the Peacemakers: Canada, the United Nations, and the Search for a Korean Armistice, 1952-53," *War and Society* (July 2011).

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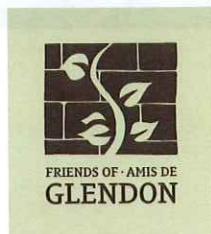
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
