




Why YorkSpace?

A variation of D-Space, the academic institutional repository software used by 39 Canadian universities and 100's in the U.S. and Europe

- Built for the purpose
- Open access to anyone
- Stability (links will never break or change)
- “High Discoverability” (all documents rank high on Google searches because of prestige of the platform)
- Permanence – “in perpetuity” with protection from political interference

1. **Adapting Canadian Work and Workplaces to Respond to Climate Change (ACW), 2014-2021**

A Digital Library re Climate Change and Workers

Approximately 200 documents have been archived in the **York University Digital Library**. These were not published by ACW or W3, but by labour unions and environmental advocacy groups in Canada, as well as some government agencies.

To our knowledge, this is the most complete collection of Canadian labour union documents related to climate change to date, and the only complete collection of the publications of Canada's **National Roundtable for the Environment and the Economy**, disbanded by the Canadian government in 2013.

To prevent these documents from disappearing from the internet, ACW has assembled this collection, and has been granted permission to reproduce these documents for educational and personal research purposes. Copyright remains with the originators and is frequently stated in the documents.

It is important to understand that these documents were assembled by ACW but are housed in the York University Digital Library and must be searched from there.



The documents and materials archived at this website are the result of research done under the direction of Principal Investigator Dr. Carla Ipsig-Mummé, Professor of Work and Labour Studies at York University between 2008 to 2022. This research was pioneering in its foresight about the problem of global heating and the potential role of workers to contribute to a cleaner economy, as documented in 2010 in *What Do We Know? What Do We Need To Know? The state of research on work, employment and climate change in Canada*. This report used a sectoral lens to assess the state of our knowledge, and to identify the gaps which subsequent researchers have addressed in the documents archived here. They are now made freely available in the hopes that future researchers and interested academics, students, and citizens, will be able to build forward from our work.

It includes chapters with a gender analysis, and which place Canada in an international context. It concludes with a research agenda for the future.
